We Need Your Help!

As IMPACT of Southern Arizona wraps up its 2014-2015 fiscal year, the staff, Board and volunteers are excited about the many expanded services we now offer through our Senior Programs.

Our new Catalina senior activity center, located in Catalina Pointe Plaza, near Carlota's, is open 9:00AM-4:00PM Monday-Friday and hosts a variety of events designed to address specific aspects of aging well. A collection of stimulating activities is designed to help area seniors get the most out of life, and live independently as long as safely possible, including opportunities to socialize, work on computers, Skype with friends and family who live out of the area, participate in low impact or chair exercises, make crafts, discuss current events, and enjoy live local entertainment and lectures.

The requests for these services has increased and the trend is growing as many continue to live on fixed incomes or are limited by health and physical ability. We are also feeding more seniors than ever before, serving more than 20,000 meals last year! This program area is our most expensive to operate as meals do not typically benefit from inkind donations of materials, as our other programs do, so individual financial donations are critical. Would you please consider making a donation to our senior programs this summer?

A donation of \$35 will provide two seniors with meals for one week and \$150 will supply food for two seniors for an entire month! A monthly pledge of \$12 to our Senior Programs will provide four meals every month for a year. You can make a single donation on our website, click on the new monthly pledge option, mail a check in the enclosed envelope, or drop by our Catalina or Vail offices to donate. These are easy ways to help your neighbors and other struggling seniors in our area. We truly appreciate your support and look forward to partnering with you to enhance the lives of our senior community members.

SaddleBrooke resident Judy Loritz is one of 19 who received an award honoring their longevity of service. Originally from Minnesota, Judy moved to Kansas and then to Tucson in 2001. Judy began volunteering for IMPACT SoAZ in 2004 and has been helping ever since. Every Tuesday during the winter months you will find her preparing meals at the Senior Center at 16701 N. Oracle #145. She is a member of a cadre of cooks and servers who prepare over 100 hot meals every Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, with nearly 30 served in the cozy dining room. A total of more than 20,000 meals were provided to seniors last year, including the hot meals at the Center and both hot and frozen meals delivered by volunteer drivers to homebound seniors in Catalina, SaddleBrooke, and Rancho Vistoso/Sun City. "I love the people I work with, "says Judy, as she points to her friend Sibyl Stewart,

another longtime volunteer in the

Senior Center kitchen. Both women grin. Judy continues, "I also love the wonderful seniors who come to the Center."

The faces may have changed over the years, but the warmth Loritz shares regarding the clients is undeniable. She mentions Mel who years ago began bringing his harmonica to play for other seniors, and still occasionally entertains. Zip, who was recruited by Sibyl as a volunteer, often shares stories from his fascinating background in archaeology.






More About Our Volunteers!

Education Programs -- ESL/Citizenship

IMPACT of Southern Arizona ESL/Citizenship Classes Offer Many the Opportunity to Change Their Futures

IMPACT SoAZ has 13 English as a Second Language volunteers. Each week from October 1 through May 22, they teach and mentor adult students on Wednesday mornings from 9:00AM-10:00AM at Mt. Shadows Presbyterian Church and at the IMPACT SoAZ office at 3535 E. Hawser Street Wednesday evenings from 6:30PM-8:00PM. The ESL Program began last fall with twenty-two students attending, five at Mt. Shadows Presbyterian Church and seventeen at the IMPACT SoAZ office. This year they added a conversation class, as well as new books and materials. The goals of the students are improving their English skills and to prepare to become U.S. citizens. The program provides assessment of students' skill levels to help insure success as they are led by the volunteer instructors.


Before beginning this year's classes, three of the volunteers, Mark Goodrich, Diana Magness, and Peggy Lombard spent time at Literacy Connects training on proven techniques for teaching non-English speakers. They then shared their new skills with our other ESL volunteers Cindy Bieger, Dennis Hester, Pat Leveque, Karen Lingelbach, Shirley Morris, Carol Osgood, Kathie Schroeder, John Turner, Nile Vernon, and Joanne Winner.

Shirley Morris is from Colorado and a former 1-2 grade teacher. Shirley fills in when they need an instructor. Karen Lingelback is a former school librarian and has been an ESL teacher for fifteen years. Karen teaches the beginning level class.

Diana Magness loves teaching the beginning class. Her focus is learning practical everyday phrases, related to activities such as health, shopping, how to ask for directions. One of her students Trinidad has been in the program two years. Av and Ann from Vietnam who have been married for four years, are very happy to be learning English. They go back to Vietnam about once a year.

Diana's students like the way she explains and they have a good time learning. The group had been meeting for one hour each week and have increased the lesson to 90 minutes two times a week, which Diana says has helped tremendously in her students' learning.

Dennis Hester, who moved from Montana and now lives in Sun City, has taught ESL students for the more than ten years. He first began with America Reads and has been learning Spanish nearly his entire life. Dennis declares, "The best thing about teaching is the students. They are motivated, friendly and so appreciative." This is Dennis' first year teaching citizenship at IMPACT SoAZ and is excited about being a volunteer mentor.

Sun City resident Peggy Lombard is also from Montana, having moved here a little over three years ago. She has been teaching ESL students for the past two years, currently as an intermediate English instructor. Peggy really enjoys interacting with her students, who she says are really enthusiastic committed to learning.

Joanne Winner lives in SaddleBrooke and teaches advanced students in civics and American history. They are working toward taking the test to become naturalized citizens, which is given in English.

When adult learner Teresa first attended classes three years ago, she knew no English at all. This year she is working independently using the language-learning software program, Rosetta Stone. Teresa says she needed

more practice with word pronunciation and the program really helps with this. When asked what she felt was her biggest accomplishment so far, she responded with a shy smile, "Speaking

English and having other people understand me."

All the adult learners come to the classes offered by IMPACT of Southern Arizona for various reasons, but they do have several things in common: they have come to improve their English, work diligently to accomplish their goals, and really love working with their mentors and other students. Two of the students will see those goals completed this summer as they get ready to interview and take their naturalization test.


IMPACTING AREA SCHOOLS





IMPACT SoAZ recently made a donation of \$1800 to the Ironwood Ridge High School SMART Science Team/HOSA. The purpose of the HOSA – a future health professionals organization, is to develop leadership and technical skill competencies through a program of motivation, awareness and recognition.

The students are guided by Liane Futch who has more than 30 years teaching, the past seven of which have been at IRHS, in anatomy/physiology and biotechnology. IRHS incorporates a significant amount of introductory biotechnology into the freshman biology curriculum and students with

A's and strong B's in biology (or a later science course) are encouraged to enroll in Biotechnology I. Throughout the year some of the students have the opportunity to travel to Grand Canyon University for Health Science and Nursing Day, HOSA Fall and Spring conferences and competitions, and UofA College of Medicine Library bioinformatics research training. Guest speakers from local indus-







Students participated in the AzHOSA 2015 Spring Leadership Conference and Competitions held at the Westin La Paloma on April 6-8. The conference included keynote speakers, competitions, exhibitors, educational sessions, and networking. IRHS's Emily Laughlin placed third at the AzHOSA Spring Leadership Conference in Transcultural Heathcare and qualifies for the 2015 National HOSA Leadership Conference this month in Anaheim, California. Chase Santua placed fifth in Extemporaneous Writing, having only one hour to write an essay on a surprise topic related to AzHOSA's relationship with community partners. IRHS had an additional 21 competitors who recently learned how they placed, including Ross Shipley (who is not in the group picture as he was competing in Medical Math at the time of the photo!). There were nearly 2000 competitors!

The monies were used for students to attend a competition in Boston for their 3D printed model depiction of a complicated protein. The money helped families cover travel expenses and to purchase hoodies with their team

logo. The balance will also be used to send one of their national-qualifying students to the competition in Anaheim





IMPACT SoAZ 9th Annual Youth Day!

Our annual Youth Day, a family-friendly event, was held on Saturday, March 14, 2015, on the soccer fields of Coronado K-8. The event ran from 10:00AM to 2:00PM with more than 400 in attendance! Youngsters participated in carnival games, inflatables, train rides, and the Turbo Rush Obstacle Course. While the children were enjoying the entertainment, many of the adults browsed the numerous community informational booths, chatting with the nonprofits and organizations about their services. Families were also treated to free BBQ hamburgers and hotdogs, served up by IMPACT SoAZ Board members, all while enjoying the music provided by a local DJ.

IMPACT SoAZ Children's Dental Program

IMPACT of Southern Arizona has created a dental program for low-income area children. All expenses are paid for by IMPACT of Southern Arizona and our partners also provide discounted services. Before starting the program, IMPACT of Southern Arizona surveyed 133 of our client households and learned:

- 10% of the children have never seen a dentist.
- 52% said their children were not insured.

With these statistics in mind, the new program has established several goals:

- ♦ To improve access to annual dental check-ups and cleanings for low-income children in the Greater Catalina area. For many of the youngsters, it is their first visit to the dentist.
- Increase the number of children who receive dental care, especially focusing on youngsters who have not received dental care in recent years.
- To educate families on the importance of dental care and its relationship to overall health and wellness.

Funding assistance comes from the MountainView/The Preserve Lady Niners Golf League. In November 2013 the league hosted Tee Up for Teeth Golf Tournament and held an on-going Checks for Check-Ups fundraiser. Both events raised \$7,043 for the dental program.

Services have also been generously discounted by Hiremath Family Dentistry in Oro Valley. To participate, families enrolled their children at the IMPACT SoAZ office, 3535 E. Hawser Street, made an appointment for a check-up with Dr. Katz, and followed up for dental services. Dr. Elizabeth Katz is a Diplomate, American Board of Pediatric Dentistry, who specializes in the dental care of infants, children, teens, and those with special medical needs. Dr. Katz declares, "It is a honor for me to

partner with Impact of Southern Arizona and provide dental services to the children in need. My whole life has been committed to helping children with the hopes of impacting their lives in a positive manner and that is why I chose the profession of Pediatric Dentistry."

To date, IMPACT SoAZ has been able to provide 19 children with dental care, with more planned in the future. Thank you so much to our community partners for making this program possible!



IMPACT SoAZ Collaborates with Other Nonprofits & Faith-Based Groups to Assist Families and Seniors



Arizona Youth Two local families recently came to IMPACT SoAZ to receive Partnership (AZYP) who in partnership with communities, cultivates healthy services. With our building partner Arizona Youth Partnership foundations for youth and promotes strong families. Headquartered in

Marana, Arizona Youth Partnership (AzYP), was founded in 1990 by a group of concerned Pima County citizens who sought to provide rural communities in the county access to the services available in the Tucson metro area. They have an office located at our main offices on Hawser Street. Araceli Parra-Bonner is the case manager. In 2006, AzYP expanded to serve rural communities across Arizona and employs a root cause approach to fighting poverty builds healthy, self-sufficient youth and families through evidence-based prevention programs and community involvement.

The first family was a homeless woman with two teenage daughters. They were previously living in a shelter for several months. AZYP helped the woman find employment as well as suitable housing for her and her children. Through their Rapid Rehousing Program AZYP pays the first month and deposit so that the family could move. IMPACT SoAZ provided some furniture as well as also paying partial rent. In the second family, both parents were out of work. AZYP found them housing and jobs. IMPACT SoAZ provided a much-needed toddler bed, stroller and couch.

Oro Valley Church of the Nazarene wanted to do something for the seniors we serve. The church is divided into small groups that meet every week for fellowship and to engage in community outreach. The group decided on a magazine project for our homebound seniors and SaddleBrooke residents Gail Bohlman and her husband, David, organized the venture. Other participants included Frank and Marsha Cristi, Charles and Sophia Colldock, Dana and Sally Keller, Carl and Lois Travor, and Hank and Linda Wolowicz. They collected extra magazines from the HOA#1 clubhouse and, in addition, group members purchased Sudoku puzzles and word search booklets. These items will be delivered in special fabric bags along with toothpaste and toothbrushes to our seniors.

Another area church recently coordinated a hands-on project. At the end of the morning, all participants shared individual experiences followed by a "Shared Sandwich" lunch.




Our First Annual Golf Tournament a Huge Success!

Once again Impact of Southern Arizona was the recipient of a generous donation that auction co-chair Arthur Posner recently presented to Barbara McClure of Impact. In addition to the money designated for IMPACT SoAZ. Arthur also gave Barbara a check to support science in the schools programs, one of Impact's programs. This auction came to fruition as a result of the persistence and dedication of a wonderful group of volunteers: Pat Andrea, Ann Coziahr, Edie Crall, Marsha Liakos, Benith MacPherson, Karen Moore, Barbara Posner, Cathy Scott, Jennifer Stephens, Victoria Wareing, and Dorthy Wood. They did an amazing job soliciting donations from community donors, as well as SaddleBrooke residents. Special thanks also to Gary Shaw who generously donated his talent as auctioneer for each auction, to Steve Liakos who served as master of ceremonies for the past several years, and to all the volunteers who helped at the events to make these auctions run so smoothly. Thanks to the committee, all volunteers and donors, we have positively impacted the lives of children and families in need.

The Treats and Talents Charity Auction gave us \$3,000 to fund science support in our local schools and another \$6,000 for the general budget to be used as needed. The money was used to help families cover the travel expenses, registration fees, and to purchase team hoodies with their team logo.
