We began in 2000 in a small slump block house in Catalina, as a food bank and resource center with a solid core of volunteers, and strong community support with materials and financial contributions. A large number of you have been with us since that very beginning,

and I would like to express my gratitude to you and our many community supporters who have joined in over the years to help us grow into the organization we are today.

Now housed in multiple locations, we are serving residents of SE Pinal County, Catalina, Oro Valley, Vail and surrounding communities, and have expanded the types of services we offer from emergency relief to community workshops, job placement, and other programs designed not just to help people get by, but to get ahead.

It is this expansion, both geographical and in types of programming, which prompted us to change our name to IMPACT of Southern Arizona, to better reflect what we do. Every service we offer creates a ripple effect, improving people's lives in many ways. 



Our Food Banks — Caring for the Hungry

We launched Mighty Impact Meals (MIM's) in the 2013/2014 school year for low-income families in Vail. These back-packs ensure that students who receive free or reduced lunches and breakfast at school will have food over the weekends. The program is a weekend supplemental food program for Vail students, providing nutritional light meals for those who may go hungry or experiencing food insecurity. At least 35 youngsters participate every week.

Fundraiser for Mighty Impact Meals — The youth of Christ Lutheran Vail, ages K-12, served brunch on June 8th and raised over \$100! These funds will be used to purchase kid-friendly food items and to create filled backpacks!

Every week we provide FREE meals to homebound seniors and low-income students referred by the Vail School District. Without these programs, many would go hungry!

Seniors: Each person receives five nutritious dinners weekly.

Youngsters: During the school year, IMPACT SoAZ provides weekend meals for more than thirty-five area students. Every Friday each child receives Mighty Impact Meals for the weekend which includes two meals each of breakfast, lunch and dinner.



Target's Tucson fulfillment center, which opened in 2009, is one of only four in the country serving Target's online customers. The Tucson center is approximately 1 million square feet in size and sits on about 100 acres! We appreciate our community partnership with Target.com and their assistance with meeting our expenses in Vail.



We have received a TEP Grants That Make a Difference in the amount of \$9500 for our new Homebound Meal Program in Vail. The TEP selection committee looks for programs Tucson Electric Power with measurable accomplishments that improve the quality of life for at-risk populations in TEP's service territory. The recipient nonprofit agencies must demonstrate financial and

organizational stability and meet other criteria. The funds will be used for meals delivered to seniors who are home bound or unable to cook. Thank you, TEP!

Our Seniors Program & Meal Delivery





IMPACT SoAZ offers two distinct meal programs for seniors who reside in the Greater Catalina and Saddlebrooke areas. Participants must be 60 or over, but their circumstances vary, including seniors recovering from surgery, someone who is physically challenged, or those with a low to moderate income. We feature freshly prepared meals on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, served family style at the Senior Center in Catalina at 16701 N. Oracle Rd., #145 from approximately 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. We also deliver meals to approximately 55 homebound seniors on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. They receive a hot meal for that day as well as frozen meals to have on the non-delivery days. *Since the first of the year we have served and delivered over 7,000 meals!*

Thanks to a generous TEP partnership grant, we are also now delivering meals in Vail.

In addition, we provide senior exercise classes, community workshops, transportation to medical appointments, and resource referrals.

We announced recently that Jan Myren who manages our senior center, was a Ben's Bell recipient, honored for her kindness to others! The write-up appeared in the Arizona Daily Star & we wanted her to have a keepsake of the article on a plaque. Here is Jan surrounded by volunteers Sibyl, Susan and Judy.

Community Outreach & Education Programs



The IMPACT AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM has ended another successful school year! We have a great program at Coronado K-8, thanks to employee Donna Ybarra, who heads the program of 25-30 students for goal-setting and leadership opportunities. The main objective of the program is homework. We offer a safe classroom environment for students to do their homework and receive help where needed. We also teach drug and alcohol awareness, physical activities, facts about nutrition, and arts and crafts.

Donna just glows when you mention her students. She reports that the last week of school was a very empowering week for her students, knowing that they reached the goals they set for themselves for the school year. Some conquered



their fears of public speaking, while others picked up their grades. One of her students was completely failing, but now has become an A student!! Great job, Donna! *You truly IMPACT LIVES & INSPIRE FUTURES*.



Parenting Class



We have five major programs: food, clothing, seniors, youth and education/community outreach. As part of community outreach we offered parenting classes every Friday morning from May 9-June 13. The classes are part of *The Incredible Years*, a program of Easter Seals Blake Foundation in partnership with First Things First and United Way of Tucson and Southern Arizona.

English as a Second Language and Citizenship Classes



We have approximately twelve English as a Second Language volunteers, many of them from SaddleBrooke. Each week during September through May, they teach and mentor adult students on Wednesday mornings at a local church or here at IMPACT every Wednesday night. Student goals: To improve their English

skills or to prepare to become U.S. citizens. Community members are also willing to share their expertise. One of them is Carol Osgood, a real estate broker, who shared her knowledge and experience, with student Barbara Quiros, whose goal is to become a bilingual realtor. We are so proud of our program & volunteers!

Bridges Out of Poverty Initiative Brought to Tucson





IMPACT SoAZ, Amphitheater Public Schools, and Pio Decimo Center Housing and Family Services, have created a Steering Committee to bring an initiative called *Bridges out of Poverty* to Southern Arizona. Based on the research of Ruby K. Payne, Ph.D., and Philip E. DeVol, it has been utilized in over 70 communities around the country who have seen evidence of its effectiveness in decreased unemployment and homelessness, increased income, pursuit of post-secondary education, and increased sense of empowerment.

Participants work in groups with a trained facilitator, meeting twice a week for fifteen weeks, exploring how to build up financial, emotional, social, and other resources to stabilize their living situation and build resources. The participants explore the impact that poverty has had on them, investigate economic realities, and develop a plan for their future. During the workshops participants will also be sharing their life experiences and expertise with their group.

Lori Bable of Pio Decimo and Rose Tederous, the Family Resource Wellness Coordinator for Amphitheater Public Schools, one of our building partners, are facilitating this pilot group. Rose declares, "The group has only been meeting for a short time, but many of the Investigators have bonded and are very excited about the *Getting Ahead* program!"

The steering committee is also bringing national trainers to Tucson for a 3-day trainer certification session July 22-24. The goal is to bring together many people from government, faith and social service organizations, education, and all socio-economic classes to learn how to apply the *Bridges* practices here in Tucson and go forward sharing the knowledge. 
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
