Our current Senior Center is 1000 square feet: 500 sq.ft. kitchen & 500 sq.ft. dining - not large

enough to meet the increasing community need for meal service. This issue lead us to develop a plan for an expanded center, but also a place to provide additional services to compliment other organizations in the area.

With Catalina's recent growth, the Golder Ranch Fire Dept. training rooms are heavily booked with community meetings and events, the Pima Park & Rec Community Center on Pinto is busy each afternoon with afterschool programs for local youth, and it can be difficult to book time on one of the six computer terminals at the local library. In addition, CCS has a need for larger gathering spaces as programs are expanding.

Therefore, we plan to move from our old Senior Center space at 16701 N Oracle, and build out a much larger 2800 sq.ft. space in the

Catalina Pointe Shopping Center at 15920 N Oracle, Unit 145.

CCS Community Center.

Located on the east side of Oracle Road, in the Center south of the Golden Goose Thrift Store, we will be able to expand our kitchen to nearly 1000 square feet, serve more seniors in a much larger dining area, include a small bank of computers, have an activity space, and be able to gather larger groups for community workshops, and presentations. We also hope to

offer the space to outside groups when available.

We'll offer other game and social activities as well. Watch our Community Center Bulletin Board for details. We are organizing classes on budgeting, help to quit smoking, walking for fitness and a variety of other life impacting topics.

Food Bank, Holiday &

People often ask us how our food bank is different from others in the area.

Here's how it works:

We are an Agency of the Community Food Bank (CFB) in downtown Tucson. They in turn are part of the Feeding America

group. The CFB serves over 250,000 individuals each month in the following 5 southern AZ Counties: Pima, Cochise, Greenlee, Graham and Santa Cruz. Counties to the north of us, such as Pinal and Maricopa, belong to a different Food Bank program through the United Way.

Both the CFB and United Way receive foods from the USDA which make up the cardboard TEFAP boxes shown above. CCS volunteers drive down to the CFB at Country Club and Ajo each week to pick up these boxes which are intended to be a three day emergency supply for families. While there, we also pick up produce,

bread and other items, if available.

The smaller box is packed by volunteers at the CFB to supply 1-2 people in a household. The larger box is intended to feed 3-4. **Because the CFB serves such a**

large number of homes, they can only supply up to 4 people per address.

In the United Way system, there are no central volunteers, so the food is delivered on pallets to those Food Banks and local volunteers package the food; however, (the same) food is provided for

every person living in the household.

Beyond the Basic Box and Bags

Beyond the boxes and bags, clients also choose items from a shelf of various donated items not packed in the bags. These additional items include



foods and toiletries—items like cake mixes, oil, crackers, light bulbs, shampoo, deodorant, toilet paper, tooth brushes, etc... All supplied by you and community partners. Clients come through for these items once each month. Bread and a few other products are available on a daily basis. Many people stop in regularly for food.

Pinal Residents in 85739 Zip Code

Ideally, Pinal residents would use the United Way Food Banks in Mammoth and Florence, but we have many local residents living just over the County line, with poor, or no transportation, and many Pinal Food Banks have limited service hours. We cannot give these area residents CFB boxes, but do allow them to come to CCS, and supply them with CCS Bags for their families, if they prefer to register in our program.

At CCS, we strive to make up the difference and provide food to each individual. This is where you, our donors, come to the rescue.

The food you donate to CCS is packed in supplemental bags, equivalent to the small cardboard TEFAP box for 1-2 people. Every home, no matter how many people live there, receives enough food from CCS for each person. A TEFAP box is given for the first four people,



with as many bags as needed to feed the rest of the house. At left is a list of items in each bag...


